Howard Hecht W1HO - I gravitated into ham radio when, at about the age of 8 I developed a fascination for all things electronic and mechanical, which led to several "take it apart, and put it back together (usually) escapades. Communications theory was studied via 2 frozen juice cans and some string pulled taut.

My parents took notice, and in an attempt to keep me from electrocuting myself (I didn't, but truth be told, it was through no lack of trying), my father got me a pair of J-38 keys (which I still have), some wire, a couple of buzzers and a battery. Thus was born my private comm system, with a friend who lived in the same apartment building - wire out my bedroom window, across a lower level roof, and into his window. With a printed copy of the International Morse code at each end, vital messages were sent - excruciatingly slow, but sent nonetheless! To this day I struggle with CW, having learned it as written dots and dashes rather than as dit & dah sounds.

From there, a crystal set (I think this was the real catalyst - I still remember being mesmerized at hearing the same radio stations we received on our big RCA radio!). At about the age of 12 I bought a Heathkit AR-3A (with the optional case!), successfully assembled it, heard hams and was hooked.

Why I didn't get licensed at that time and finally became WN1LWD at age 26, is a whole other story. Maybe next February I'll tell it.

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Some Appropriate Quotes

I found these quotes on "Good Amateur Practice". A couple of days ago, I was listening to two or three Hams "rag chewing", and they did not give anyone any time between their comments to allow anyone to break in either for an emergency or just to possibly join the conversation. In this case there were a number of school kids that were being demonstrated Amateur Radio on HF, and the Operator was trying to get someone to say hi over the air. These quotes are relevant no matter what year they were said. Quoted with permission.

- **9-7-2003:** When operating HF, VHF, or even UHF, be sure to leave a second or so between transmissions so anyone wishing to break-in can do so. That break-in could even be emergency traffic. **Mark W0MH**
- 2-1-2005: FCC rules require that we use call sign identification every 10 minutes and at the end of a QSO. The rules do not require an ID at the beginning of a transmission although that is common courtesy. It is important to note that you should make your call sign the last thing you say when checking in on a Net. A full call sign is also required when doing a simplex check-in or even a brief check-in.

- 10-04-2005: Don't Mumble: As hams, we learn to communicate. To be effective communicators, we need to be heard clearly. So, speak clearly and distinctly. Proper microphone technique is part of this. Try different microphone positions and have other operators comment how easily they can copy you. Yes, you know what you are saying, but others may not hear you clearly enough to get the full meaning of what you are saying. Radio broadcast announcers "modulate" their voices for consistent level so they can be understood, even in noisy environments. You can too. It is good operating practice. Mark WOMH
- You do yourself, and others, a favor by clearly announcing your call sign when you are on the air. Yes, you know your call so well that you can say it twice as fast as you normally talk. That is a problem for others. Call signs should be given more slowly than regular speech so that everyone, including people you don't even know, can hear and understand it. It is a matter of courtesy and good operating practice. Mark WOMH

Events in Radio

- February 1892: British chemist and physicist William Crookes
 publishes an article suggesting "Hertzian waves" (radio waves)
 could be, and he claimed already were being, used in wireless
 telegraphy.[19]
- February 1902: Marconi starts conducting more organized and documented tests sailing on board the SS Philadelphia west from Great Britain recording signals sent daily from the Poldhu station showing reception up to 2,100 miles (3,400 km).
- 18 February 1922: Warren G. Harding becomes the first U.S. president-elect to be heard on radio when he makes an appearance on KDKA.
- 26 February 1922: In California, Joseph Franklin Rutherford transmitted his first radio Bible sermon.
